and can tell some interesting stories
about the West and has a piece of the
bark of a tree brought by himself from
Washington, in which state he worked
for some time in a charcoal mill. This
piece of bark is two feet thick and the
tree from which it was cut, eleven feet in
diameter and 250 feet high.
Last fall, having read in the Bible that
it is not good for man to live alone, and
fully believing the statement to be true,
Mr. Pettit went to Illinois where a cer-
tain Miss Anna Barnhart lived, and
when he returned to Nebraska, she was
Mrs. Charles W. Pettit, and his home in-
dicates that he made a wise choice.
F. F. TULLY
with his brother Charles, came here from
Indiana in 1875, and bought eighty
acres near Spalding in Greeley county
and in a few years he took a homestead
and timber claim near Clear Creek,
Wheeler county. Sometime after this he
sold his homestead, living on his timber
claim, and bought a quarter adjoining
it. This land he traded and sold for a
farm in Iowa, and in 1898 came to
Cedar Rapids, and losing his wife had a
troubled and varied experience until
1897 when he traded his Iowa land for
an eighty in 83-19-7 and made up his
mind to make this his home. Last fall
he bought a quarter in 8-18-7.
Like many other good farmers Mr.
Tully has put up some good barns and
farm buildings for his stock and grain,
but neglected his house. However this
is to be remedied this spring when he
will have a particularly fine place. The
trees in his orchard came from Albion
and he says are doing well. He has
thirty head of cattle but not many hogs,
fearing to put them on the place as the
cholera was very bad there last year.
CARL KNOPP
owns half of 13-19-7 that he bought with
the proceeds of the sale of half a section
that he owned in Nance county where he
had lived for seventeen years.
This was a well improved farm when
he bought it, but has no orchard.
Mr. Knopp has put in 170 acres of
corn, ten of wheat and eight of oats.
He has twenty-three head of Shorthorn
cattle, but for the same reason as his
neighbor Tully, has no hogs.
I noticed that the cockle-burrs were
very thick in the fifty-acre pasture and
in some of the fields, but "these," Mrs.
Knopp, with whom I talked said, "have
had their day. My husband will not
rest till every burr is off the place." He
was at work on them when I was there,
but much too far for me to go to him.
F. A. SIMONS.
Twelve years ago John and F. A.
Simons bought three quarters of 28-18-7
and began the work of improving it.
They also own 980 acres in Greeley
county, which they use for pastures. The
Simons are in the agricultural and hard-
ware business in Cedar Rapids, where
they own their own building, sheds and
lots.

who lives in a mighty good-looking
house with good barns, sheds and stock
